We also did not hold a Unit game in December, due to conflicts with Rancho Mirage, Pasadena, and the Christmas holiday. In the January Unit Team Game (YES – we are trying this on for size – if it's popular enough, we'll do it more often), The winners were Steve Anderson, Gary Atwell, Kiran Kumar, and Woody Woodman. They posted 5½ wins and 107 Victory Points. Second, with 5 wins and 98 VPs we find John Jones, Tom Reynolds, Roger Boyar, and Dale Quasny. Also with 5½ wins but only 90 VPs, the team of Bill Papa, Peter Kavounas, Kitty Moon, and Tom Cusack, took third. Finally, the team of Tim and Eileen Finlay, Nona Stokes, and Ramona Hernandez took home first place in Flight C. No one was shut out, each team won at least two matches (out of 8), so no one went home empty handed.

A number of Unit 551 players acquitted themselves well at the recent Palm Springs / Rancho Mirage regional tournament. The foursome of Mary Ann Wotring, Vic Sartor, Richard Parker, and Caryn Mason played in various combinations in several team-of-four sessions, winning two events and finishing second in a third.

Caryn also partnered District 23 President John Jones on the winning team in a top level team event and even played a starring role – bidding and bringing home a tough slam to win a crucial match. For the week, she led all local players with 43.30 gold points in just three days.

Richard Parker was close behind with 34.88. Vic Sartor brought home 29.97, and Mary Ann Wotring (who missed one session due to illness) garnered 25.89.

Dan Robinson got 1.07 for a fine 61% morning session with David Ochroch in the Gold Rush pairs. Not a bad performance for our little contingent.

NABC Master; and Sofi Kasubhai is an Advanced NABC Master. Congratulations, and keep up the good play.


Special congratulations go to Dan Robinson, who has been selected by the California Pharmacist Association as the 2025 Pharmacist of the Year.

Here's a hand that came up some time ago, that I've been holding onto (for when there are no really bizarre ones to report on). South is the dealer, no one is vulnerable. I'll show the whole hand:



So! You are West, and all set to either bid 2♠ after South opens 1♠, or else 2NT after an opening bid of 1♠. Otherwise you can just bid your heart suit, right?

Guess again! South upsets the apple card by opening one HEART. Eek. Well, you can just bid 24, which you do.

North passes, and East – for reasons best known to herself – bids 2♠ on that sturdy five-card suit. South passes, and you certainly have nowhere to go. Now North chimes in with 3♠!

This awful contract goes one down due to the horrid trump split, but it was not such a bad board for N-S after all. While -50 was the normal result, one enterprising E-W pair went for 3NT, making four! Hmmm, on a diamond lead, you get six clubs, one diamond, one heart, and one spade. Don't ask me where the 10th trick comes from.
